Scripture

The gospel of Luke and the book of Acts are a two volume set. Acts continues where the story left off. Luke ends with Jesus appearing to disciples on the road to Emmaus, then to the eleven in Jerusalem, followed by a brief report of his ascension to heaven. Acts expands on these events, telling of Jesus appearing to the disciples over a forty day period, continuing to teach them, and ordering them to wait in Jerusalem where they will shortly "be baptized with the Holy Spirit." Our reading picks up just after Jesus says this.

Acts 1:6-14


So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

¹²Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. ¹³When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. ¹⁴All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

Holy Spirit Come to Us






Communion of the People
