We believe


- o that Christ's work of reconciliation is made manifest in the church as the community of believers who have been reconciled with God and with one another;

# **Opening Prayer**


Scripture Philippians 2:1-8

And being found in human form, <sup>8</sup>he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death — even death on a cross.

**Reflection** James Sledge


This is the final sermon reflecting on themes from the Confession of Belhar, written in South Africa when apartheid was official policy of the white controlled government and the white, Dutch Reformed Church. Belhar offered a theological challenge to apartheid from Christians of color in the Dutch Reformed Mission Church. Belhar named division based on race as sin, and called Christians and the Church to ministries of reconciliation, justice, and unity. The Presbyterian Church (USA), a part of the Reformed theological family, added Belhar to our Book of Confessions in 2016.





The opening and closing stanza expresses the essence of this folk-style song about the mutuality of servant ministry: those who serve must also be willing to be served. This is what Christ intended when he commanded the disciples to "wash one another's feet" (John 13:14).



Silent Witness Against Racial Injustice, July 17. Members of Falls Church faith communities and neighborhoods will join together on Friday, July 17, from 5-6 p.m. along Broad Street in silent witness to highlight racial injustice and elevate Black voices. In May we witnessed George Floyd's death in Minneapolis and were reminded of disparities in policing in our nation. Closer to home, the Arlington Coalition of Black Pastors recently stated that we must work to ensure that "African Americans, and all persons of color, are fully valued, and our humanity honored, by our leaders and fellow citizens alike. This means having both the freedom from abuse and discrimination and the protection of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness that is afforded to all others." Rain or shine, bring your sign.
