Opening Prayer

Scripture

The biblical book of Isaiah seems to contain the words of at least three different prophets. The book takes its name from a Judean prophet named Isaiah who prophesied from 738 until around 700 B.C.E. His words are found in chapters 1-39. Chapters 40-55 come from an unnamed prophet labeled Second Isaiah or Deutero-Isaiah, who worked during the Babylonian exile (597-539 B.C.E.). Some scholars think chapters 56-66 are also from Second Isaiah, but most suggest a disciple or disciples who used his work as a model. Third Isaiah likely works sometime after 520 B.C.E. following the post-exilic return to Jerusalem.

- ¹ O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence —
- ² as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence
- ³ When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.
- ⁴ From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.
- ⁵ You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.
- ⁶ We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth
- We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.

Silent Witness, December 5. Please join the Falls Church faith community on Dec. 5 from noon to 1:00 p.m. in a Silent Witness Against Racial Injustice and to highlight racial inequities in COVID-19 exposures to prison populations. According to a Pew Research study, Blacks represented 33% of prison populations in 2018, which is triple their 12% share of the U.S. population. During the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 40 of the 50 largest clustered outbreaks of the disease occurred in prison populations, according to a Lancet study in October. These clusters could be minimized if prison populations were reduced to 85% of capacity; however, prisons tend to be closer to 103% capacity. Also in October, prison populations were 5.5 times more likely to be exposed to the disease than the general populations from the disease. Therefore, the systemic racism that incarcerates Black Americans at a much higher rate than whites are also subjecting them to greater risk of exposure to a disease that will have a greater impact on them if they are infected.
