

Opening Prayer

The Genesis creation poem has a long history of misinterpretation. Often God is said to have created *ex nihilo* or out of nothing, but the story makes no such claim. The story's claim is neither historical nor scientific, rather it insists that God summons order and life into existence out of chaos. God will be known and will act through God's powerful speech.

Mark's Gospel is the oldest of the four and is used by both Matthew and Luke their primary source material. Mark introduces Jesus full grow, with no apparent interest in Jesus's origins or his life prior to his baptism. For Mark, the story begins with John and baptism.

⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

⁹In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. ¹¹And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."







Silent Witness Against Racial Injustice, Jan. 16. Join is in silent witness and to celebrate the life of Martin Luther King Jr. from noon to 1 p.m. along Broad Street. In his "Letter From a Birmingham Jail," Dr. King wrote: For years now I have heard the word "wait." It rings in the ear of every Negro with a piercing familiarity. This "wait" has almost always meant "never." It has been a tranquilizing thalidomide, relieving the emotional stress for a moment, only to give birth to an ill-formed infant of frustration.... First, I must confess that over the last few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate. I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro's great stumbling block in the stride toward freedom is not the White Citizens Councilor or the Ku Klux Klanner but the white moderate who is more devoted to order than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice; who constantly says, "I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I can't agree with your methods of direct action"; who paternalistically feels that he can set the timetable for another man's freedom; who lives by the myth of time; and who constantly advises the Negro to wait until a "more convenient season." Shallow understanding from people of good will is more bewildering than outright rejection.

The time for justice is **now**... the time for direct action is **now**... the time to confront systemic racism is **now**. Wear a mask, bring a sign, and join us on Jan. 16. Questions? Contact Kevin <u>Ayers</u>.
