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## **Pastor's letter**

Dear siblings in Christ,

It feels a little strange to sit down to write this Chimes letter/article.

Typically I would talk about the upcoming stewardship season or the move to a post Covid environment or some other event or activity in the life of the congregation. But now I am writing knowing that this newsletter will barely have been published before I am no longer the pastor here. So what do I say when I know that the future here doesn't include me?

Perhaps one thing I can do is to assure you that FCPC will keep on keeping on. A church is not its pastor. Pastors, like elders and deacons and others in the church, have a role to play, but the real strength of the church is in its members. It is members who sing in the choir, who keep Welcome Table going, who show up for the Shout Out for Justice, and more. All of those things will continue without me just as they did while I was here.

FCPC will celebrate its 150th birthday this year, and it has seen a long list of pastors come and go over the years. Hopefully this congregation will be around for another 150 years, and during that time many more pastors will come and go. The constant will be the people who make up the church.

Churches do seem to like having pastors, however, and we are fortunate that Megan Klose is on staff and is willing to work full time until a transitional pastor joins her. Sermons will still get preached, Session meetings will be moderated, and pastoral care will be provided. You needn't worry. You are and will be in good hands.

And as you've likely heard by now, my successor is not the two and a half years away that many people feared. A pastor nominating committee should be interviewing prospective new pastors by this summer, and your new pastor should arrive within a year, maybe less. Meanwhile, you'll be busy keeping FCPC humming along, and the time will pass quickly.

All that time, I'll be thinking about you and praying for you, and I will miss you. I'll miss the conversations during fellowship time. I'll miss the discussions in Bible study. I'll miss the energy and passion that people brought to various ministry teams. I'll miss handing out gift cards at Welcome Table and talking to all the people who make Welcome table work. I'll even miss meetings. There have been hard and difficult meetings here and there, but mostly I have

## **Good morning, Church!**

I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord ... to give you a future filled with hope. (Jeremiah 29:11)

With the new year, I am naturally looking forward to what is coming up in the church calendar. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 22, and will carry us through April 9 to Holy Week and Easter. In looking forward, I am reflecting back on the Advent and Christmas season so fresh behind us. It felt like a rich and full time. I am hoping we can experience that same depth in the season to come.

A few things stand out to me about Advent and Christmas. It was lovely to have various friends and families lead lighting the Advent candles. It was especially poignant to have your words in those liturgies. Each week we asked a different question that could be answered lightly or more vulnerably. Some of your responses resonated with particular authenticity, which lent depth and immediacy to our worship.

Low-stakes Advent crafts between Sunday services provided space for folks to chat and play. These were intergenerational activities, so parents could visit while they lightly supervised their kids or worked with them side by side. Sometimes it was adults only. Each week we left with a simple, satisfying little piece of art.

These structured activities enhanced the season because they invited us all to join in some way, as we could, at our own comfort level. I heard that some of our youngest disciples in particular were delighted to hear their words in worship. I hope to continue to find ways to create worship that is at once universally Christian and specific to FCPC. I also hope we continue to offer drop-in activities during the 9:30 hour. Please let me know if you have an activity you would like to see happen on Sunday morning.

#### Wednesday night Soup and Scripture class for Lent




#### **Services for Holy Week**






## **Crooked Steeple Literary Festival**








# **Chuck Hobbie publishes fourth book**

### Through Grateful Eyes: The Peace Corps Experiences of Dartmouth's Class of 1967

FCPC elder Chuck Hobbie recently published *Through Grateful Eyes: The Peace Corps Experiences of Dartmouth's Class of 1967*. Forty-three members of Chuck's all-male college class, plus eight spouses, served in the Peace Corps. The book sets forth in their own words what 19 of them did overseas as volunteers in 15 different countries in the earliest years of the Peace Corps—in programs of health, education, forestry, agriculture, architecture, tourism, conservation, hydrology, marketing, engineering, law, rural development, and urban development. Each describes the people with whom they lived and worked, the challenges they met and overcame, and how they were changed by their experience while pursuing their mission of world peace and friendship.

Chuck's previously published books include: Days of Splendor, Hours like Dreams—Four Years at a Small College in the Far North (a memoir of Chuck's college years, work in Sweden, and study in France); The Time of the Monkey, Rooster, and Dog—A Peace Corps Volunteer's Years in Korea 1968-1971 (Congressional Commendation awarded at the Library of Congress, September 2011); and Buffalo Wings (a childhood memoir). All are available online.



# **Confirmation Class of 2022, Lent at FCPC**








Celebrating confirmands with cake!
