Good morning, Church!

Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave. (Philippians 2:4-7a)

Something that has given me hope lately is the Matthew 25 group, which grew out of the Justice Ministry. We've been meeting Sunday mornings since May to read and discuss *Necessary Risks*: *Challenges Privileged People Need to Face* by Teri McDowell Ott. Ott, who is currently the editor of *Presbyterian Outlook*, is a white woman who served for a time as Dean of the Chapel for Monmouth College. This book grew out of her experience working with marginalized students at Monmouth and teaching at a men's prison.

In working with these people, Ott became aware of the unconscious and subconscious assumptions she, as a white women of privilege, held about how to talk to students (it depends on who the students are), how to organize activities (it depends on the activity and audience), and what she had to offer people very different from herself (a lot more than she expected, but not in the way she expected).

The book is organized by ten "risks" privileged people need to face:

- 1. *Risk going* into a non-privileged context.
- 2. *Risk staying* even when conversations or situations get uncomfortable.
- 3. *Risk learning* about marginalized culture and history from books and other media.
- 4. Risk teaching in a way that invites everyone to contribute.
- 5. *Risk following* by letting people who don't lead much have a chance.
- 6. *Risk leading* by using our privilege to advocate for justice for all.
- 7. Risk listening by being truly present to marginalized voices and tending to our reflexive reactions elsewhere.
- 8. *Risk speaking* out for justice, even if your position is unpopular.
- 9. *Risk failing* at something important. Better to fail and learn than not to try.
- 10. *Risk succeeding* by responding to the call of our hearts. There are a million ways to rationalize ourselves out of taking an action the Spirit is nudging us toward. Disrupt your comfort.

Each week, rich discussion has emerged from the group reflecting vulnerably on Ott's words and relating the chapters to our lives. We wonder when it's okay to try to enter another group's space; we explore past events with new perspective; and we identify places in our lives where we can serve as "intermediary gadflies," to riff on a term by Martin Luther King, Jr.

Just as Jesus saw his privilege not as something to lord over people but as something to leverage for the salvation of the world, we people of privilege are called to examine own our privilege so that we can leverage it for the good of all. We are already talking about what we will do next. It is good to struggle together, to experience recognition and grace without being let off the hook. Reading this book together is an important step in moving us toward living more fully into God's call to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God.

Falls Church Presbyterian's 150th Anniversary

2023 marks the 150th anniversary of the founding of Falls Church Presbyterian Church. Presbyterians had been meeting in Falls Church since 1812, when The Rev. William Maffit was directed by the Baltimore Presbytery to devote himself to planting roots in areas of Northern Virginia, one being Falls Church. When Lewinsville Presbyterian (McLean) was built in 1843, Falls Church members traveled there on rolling, rough, and rutted roads to attend worship. Later, the Lewinsville pastor began to make the trip to Falls Church twice a month and services were held in members' homes and later a schoolhouse. Membership grew, funds were raised, and Groot Hall (located where the present sanctuary now stands) was purchased in 1866 as a new church home. In 1873, a momentous decision was made to withdraw from the mother church at Lewinsville and form an independent organization to be known as "The Presbyterian Church of Falls Church, Virginia." It was another 11 years before our "Old Stone Church" — the original sanctuary — was built.



Chuck's thoughtful and, at times, humorous questions were a good match for Homes' own lightning wit and intelligent comments on national affairs and the current state of the country.

We are happy to report that the National Capital Presbytery has awarded us an Equipping Congregations for Ministry grant for the purpose of supporting the Crooked Steeple Literary Festival. The grant is for \$3500 and will be used to partially cover next year's expenses. The Festival planners have already begun to organize for next year. We are thrilled that our first author, Meredith Hall, will read from her book, *Beneficence*, on November 11, 2023. Critics have stated, "If the word 'luminous' did not already exist, you would have to invent it to describe Meredith Hall's radiant new novel, *Beneficence*."


